Prevention of infectious diseases

In Japan, limitations on work, recommendation to enter a medical institution for infectious diseases and the disinfecting of one's home is decided by law depending on the type of infectious disease.

Tuberculosis

Though the number of people with tuberculosis is fewer than in the past, today, the disease is still one of the most infectious diseases with more than 10,000 patients every year in Japan.

If the discovery of the disease is late, the possibility of infecting one's family members and others around the infected individual is high.

In order to detect the disease early, receiving health examinations is important. You should receive a tuberculosis health examination at your place of work, school, or at a public health office of the city, where you live.

Regarding the medical treatment of tuberculosis, a system that covers medical expenses by public expenditure is available. This system enables to relieve the burden of patient's expenses and make the patient to undergo a fair treatment with a sense of security. AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) is a disease that develops after being infected with HIV. The 3 routes are (1) blood, (2) semen/sperm, vaginal secretion fluid, (3) mother's (breast) milk.
